The meeting agenda was posted on the Commission's website, www.lgc.state.pa.us, on Monday, October 7, 2024, and outside of the Commission's office located at 506 Irvis Office Building. Any questions on agenda items for consideration by the Commission were addressed during the meeting. After adjournment, the recording of the meeting will be posted on the Commission's website at www.lgc.state.pa.us.

The Members reviewed the minutes of the September 18, 2024, business meeting, which were unanimously approved on a motion by Senator Dush and a second by Senator Brown. The financial reports for the month of September 2024 were presented, and an explanation was given by the Executive Director. The financial reports were unanimously approved on a motion by Representative Freeman and a second by Representative Moul.

Proposed legislation that would amend the Workers' Compensation Act to include the engagement in organized fundraising activities as within the scope of employment for members of volunteer fire departments, volunteer ambulance corps, and volunteer rescue squads, other than social members was provided to the Members for their review. The legislation amends the Act of June 2, 1915, P.L. 736, No. 338, Workers' Compensation Act, by making changes to the following three sections:

- (1) Section 601(a)(1)-(a)(3) Adds the language that a participating member of a volunteer fire department/company, volunteer ambulance corps, and volunteer rescue squad, to provide coverage for "engaging in organized fundraising activity."
- (2) Section 601(f)(4) Adds the language that a participating member of a volunteer fire department/company who does not respond to emergency calls and is not a social member is covered when "engaging in organized fundraising activity."
- (3) Section 601(g)(3) Adds the language that a participating member of a volunteer ambulance corps who does not respond to emergency calls and is not a social member is covered for "engaging in organized fundraising activity."

This bill would provide coverage for volunteers who are injured while organizing or engaging in organized fundraising activities at volunteer fire departments and with the volunteer ambulance corps. Volunteers shall be covered as though they were employees and compensated for damages and injuries sustained while engaging in organized fundraising activities. Representative Moul queried if the amendment protects volunteers who are injured going to and from the location of the fundraising activity. Mr. Burman confirmed that the amendment would include travel for an event. This proposal is supported by the Pennsylvania State Association of Township Supervisors and their input was used in drafting language for this bill. The Members agreed unanimously to the proposed amendments and directed Commission staff to prepare the language for introduction into both chambers with Senator Dush and Representative Moul as prime sponsors.

Senior Research Analyst Julia Frey provided details on the fourth annual Local Government Symposium scheduled for Thursday, October 24. Ms. Frey stated that the morning session will focus on stormwater management and flood control planning, and the afternoon session will pertain to housing availability and affordability. The Members reviewed an Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement (Agreement) that was received, via e-mail, by the Commission on October 23, 2024, between Adams County and the United States Department of Justice, United States Marshals Service Prisoner Operations Division ("USMS") to provide for the housing, safekeeping, subsistence, and care of Federal prisoners at the Adams County Adult Correctional Complex.

Pursuant to statute, the Commission is required to provide an advisory written response to a proposed intergovernmental agreement within 90 days of the agreement's submission. Notwithstanding this mandate, a failure of the Commission to provide a written response has no

effect of the legal efficacy of the agreement so long as it has been submitted to the Commission prior to execution. Consistent with the Applicant's request, the Commission provided an expedited review.

The Commission does not regard the review of agreements between a Pennsylvania local government and a political subdivision of another state as involving a power to veto or enjoin; but, in accordance with the requirements of 53 Pa.C.S. § 2314, the Commission is charged with undertaking a review of the agreement and providing an advisory written response of its review of, and any recommended changes to, the agreement with regard to form and compatibility with the laws of this Commonwealth.

The terms of the Agreement reflect the conditions upon which Adams County will provide services to federal prisoners at the Adams County Adult Correctional Complex, the conditions for housing, safekeeping, subsistence and care required by USMS, and payments rates by USMS. Although the Agreement is "perpetual," Agreement duration is adequately reflected in the power to terminate at the discretion of either party of the Agreement by 30 days written notice, or less in response to an emergency. The services provided by Adams County are billable to USMS on a per diem, guard and transportation hourly rate, and the federal General Services Administration mileage rate by monthly invoice.

After thorough review, the Commission has discovered no legal authority compelling it to conclude that the Agreement is not in compliance with Pennsylvania law. It appears that the Agreement is in proper form and compatible with the laws of this Commonwealth. Provided Adams County appropriately authorizes this Agreement by ordinance or resolution, no discernible case law, statutory or regulatory provisions apparently threaten the substantive validity of the Agreement.

The Members unanimously agreed on a motion by Representative Moul and a second by Representative James to authorize Commission staff to send correspondence detailing the Commission's comments to all involved entities.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:12 a.m.

Consolidated Code Distribution Proposal

Background:

The Code account is specifically appropriated for printing and distribution of municipal codes, with state tax dollars, to elected and appointed municipal officials. This was historically a statutory duty contained within the 1935 organic law of the Local Government Commission. Past Commissions were largely of the opinion that the agency should migrate away from hard copy printing, reasoning that the technology was sufficiently available for individual elected and appointed officials and constituents to access, view, and print the codes at will with their own resources. The account currently holds a non-lapsing balance of approximately \$277,006.14. As this Commission is aware, since 2019 we have requested \$0 in the code account based on this policy. Nevertheless, we have received the standard \$24,000 appropriation every cycle.

Currently, the Commission prints and distributes only the Second Class Township Code, both the permanent edition (larger book of the entire code printed every 10 years), and the Cumulative Supplements (the changes to the law that occur during every session after the permanent edition is published). The Commission staff also distributes those codes and supplements to the townships based on a mailing list database. All costs and labor incurred by this process is state funded.

The Legislative Reference Bureau (LRB) has a long-term contract with the vendor who prints the Consolidated Statutes. Since 2014 when the Borough Code was consolidated into Title 8, and in 2015 when the Third Class City Code was consolidated into Title 11, hard copy books printed by the LRB are available at The State Bookstore, or through a subscription with LRB.

The Pennsylvania State Association of Boroughs has been receiving reports from its members that they are having trouble getting codes and supplements from the Bookstore.

Proposal:

Given the nature of the problem and the existing appropriation specifically for this purpose, I propose the following:

- The Commission should continue to refrain from printing Title 8 and Title 11, both the permanent edition and supplement. Doing so would duplicate existing efforts of the LRB.
- The Commission should continue to print and distribute the Second Class Township Code and supplement.
- The Code account should be used to fund the distribution of *supplements alone* to boroughs and cities, and first class townships, once the code is consolidated. The projected cost of this effort would be approximately \$15,000 every two years for boroughs, and \$3,000 every two years for cities. First class township distribution would be approximately \$4,500.
- The supplements would be delivered *in bulk* to the PSAB and PML for distribution to its members free of charge. This will save LGC staff resources on distribution.
